Ghana launches

On 7th of June Blue Skies Ghana celebrated the first 'Founder's Day'. The day was introduced by people in Ghana to recognise the achievements of Blue Skies Founder Anthony Pile on his birthday.

Alistair Djimatey who manages the Blue Skies Foundation in Ghana is part of the committee which came up with the idea for 'Founders Day'. He said "Anthony started Blue Skies in Ghana in 1998. He started from scratch and built the business to a company which now employs over 2000 people in three continents" He added, "On Founder's Day we say thank you to Anthony, and look to follow his example by doing something positive for our community"

The day was marked with a special programme which featured cultural displays from the local Primary School in Dobro and speeches from farmers and staff. There was also a demonstration by the Blue Skies Ghana 'Keep Fit Club' and a presentation to officially launch a new freshly squeezed juice product.

During the week leading up to Founders Day people at Blue Skies participated in a number of activities including talks on the history and background of Blue Skies, and donations to local causes such as the Nsawam Hospital where food and supplies were handed over to hospital staff by people from Blue Skies.

Anthony remarked "I am deeply touched and surprised with this kind gesture from my friends in Ghana. I have never had such a celebrated birthday and I shall always look back on the day with fond memories"

Some eye opening claims about coconut water



The naturally sterile coconut water has won the hearts of many due to the overwhelming benefits it gives to mankind. It is tagged the "Fluid of Life". In fact, during the Pacific War of 1941-45, both sides in the conflict regularly used coconut water siphoned directly from the nut to give emergency plasma transfusions to wounded soldiers. The English name coconut, first mentioned in English print in 1555, comes from Spanish and Portuguese word coco, which means "monkey face." Spanish and Portuguese explorers found a resemblance to

a monkey's face in the three round indented markings or "eyes" found at the base of the coconut. Coconuts are the fruits of the coconut palm, botanically known as cocos nucifera with nucifera meaning "nut-bearing." The fruit-bearing palms are native to Malaysia, Polynesia and Southern Asia, and are now also prolific in South America, India, the Pacific Islands, Hawaii and Florida. It is botanically classified as a drupe and not a nut. It is the largest seed known.

The light, fibrous husk allowed it to easily drift on the oceans to other areas to propagate. It is believed that coconut palms were introduced in West Africa by the Portuguese about 500 years ago. It is believed that their cultivation in Ghana started in Keta in the Volta region. They were however gradually propagated along the coastal areas of the country such as the Greater Accra Region, Central and Western Regions.

Coconut water is the liquid that is taken from unripe coconuts. If coconuts get ripe the liquid that is inside hardens and becomes part of the white flesh of the coconut, which is used to make coconut milk. So picking the coconut while it is unripe will ensure that the body gets all the benefits of coconut water.

Coconut water is one of the best drinks to rehydrate the body. It naturally replenishes body fluids. Coconut water is a natural isotonic solution having the same electrolytic balance as we have in our blood. For this reason, many athletes and persons who work out are regularly encouraged to drink coconut water to replace all the minerals and fluid that they lose while working out. It keeps the body cool and at the proper temperature. It also balances pH and reduces the risk of cancer.

Coconut water is biologically pure, full of natural sugars, salts and vitamins which ward off fatigue. It is low in fats, cholesterol and chlorides and this attribute of coconut water aids in weight loss. It reduces food cravings and keeps a person feeling full. It is an excellent drink for diabetics as it is good in nutrients required by diabetics to keep their sugar levels in control. The presence of minerals, potassium and magnesium in coconut water greatly reduces the risk of kidney stones.

Tender coconut fluids act as a natural diuretic because it has properties that tend to

Tender coconut fluids act as a natural diuretic because it has properties that tend to increase urine production and flow. Urologists around the world recommend that kidney stone sufferers should drink coconut water every alternate day to gradually reduce their stone size for easy elimination.

It is packed with lots of vital nutrients and rich in amino acids, enzymes, dietary fibre, vitamin C and minerals such as potassium, magnesium and manganese. It is also an excellent source of B- complex vitamins such as riboflavin, niacin, thiamin, pyridoxine and folates.

Coconut water reduces hypertension because it contains high levels of potassium which promotes the excretion of water out of the body. It carries oxygen and nutrients to cells and also boosts the immune system. Interestingly, coconut water works miracles on the skin too. Coconut water has cytokinins which are beneficial for anti-ageing effects according to researches. When applied to acne, spots, wrinkles, stretch marks, cellulite and eczema it clears up the skin giving a youthful- looking smoother skin. It can be used as a light moisturizer on an oily skin. In addition to the benefits to the skin it also helps in repairing and growth of nails and smooth hair. It possesses anti-viral and anti-bacterial properties as well.

Coconut water contains monolaurin, an antiviral, antibacterial and antiprotozoal monoglyceride that is used to kill lipid-coated viruses such as HIV, Herpes, cytomegalovirus, flu and various pathogenic bacteria.

People who have typhoid, malaria, fevers or other ailments that are known to induce vomiting, drink coconut water to settle the stomach. As such, coconut water is also a good thing to drink during a hangover. Drinking coconut water with one teaspoon of olive oil for three days will kill intestinal worms and clear the stomach of worms. This enhances better digestion. It also raises metabolism.
